#### GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR 4-H/FFA and OPEN CLASS EXHIBITORS

- 1. Youth and adult exhibitors, leaders, superintendents, as well as the general public, are expected to act in a courteous manner with respect to all animals and exhibits. They are expected to use humane treatment and safe management practices with all animals. NO abuse will be tolerated. This includes using appropriate behavior and language at all times.
- 2. Audubon County Fair Board will take all precautions for the safe keeping of animals and articles from entry to dismissal; but the association will not be responsible for any loss, accident, or damage that may occur.
- 3. Superintendents are responsible for all animals and articles in their department from entry to dismissal. They will make stall assignments, assist with entries, judging and display.
- 4. Animals or exhibits not meeting judging criteria, will not be awarded a premium; even if they are the only one in the class.
- 5. Each exhibit may be entered in one project area only.
- 6. The use of drugs and alcohol is prohibited on the fairgrounds. NO smoking is allowed in any building. Any person found intoxicated, in possession of drugs, or acting in a disorderly manner will be ejected immediately.
- 7. Security will be on the grounds day and night to protect property and to preserve order.
- 8. Exhibitor must keep animal under control or be excused from the show ring. Unnecessary roughness or discourtesy will also dismiss exhibitor.
- 9. Animals must meet all requirements listed under HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY AND BIRDS AT LOCAL COUNTY FAIRS.

Violation of any rule may result in loss of premium money and disqualification of exhibit and/or exhibitor. Fair Board department superintendent, extension staff (county 4-H committee or extension council, if appropriate) will interpret, review, and revise rules and settle all questioners' differences.

#### **GENERAL 4-H/FFA RULES**

- 1. Exhibitors must be Audubon County 4-H members, who filed enrollments in the Audubon County Extension Office or in 4-H online by May 15; or vocational agricultural members, who are certified by their instructors by May 15.
- 2. Exhibitors must have completed 4<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> grade but have not graduated from high school prior to January 1, 2023. Official 4-H grade is determined Sept. 15, 2022:

JUNIOR - 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> grades INTERMEDIATE - 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> grades SENIOR - 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> grades

- 3. Members should be enrolled, but are not required to be enrolled, in the specific project area May 15, to exhibit in that area. Exhibits must be the work of the member, as an outgrowth of a 4-H/FFA project. 4-H and FFA Livestock (breeding heifers, swine, feeder calves, bottle bucket, dairy, goat, horse, and dog) are to be entered into 4-H Online2.0 by May 15. Animals identified as a 4-H project cannot be identified or exhibited as an FFA project. FFA projects can not be entered in 4-H online and must be ID'd on the proper form and turned into the Extension Office by May 15.
- 4. Members and parents are responsible to know all project rules and guidelines; which are the same for 4-H and FFA members. All exhibits, activities, and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures developed around the evaluation process.
- 5. 4-H members must participate in at least six of their 4-H club's regular meetings from September to July and give an Educational Presentation to be eligible to show at County Fair.
- 6. If member cannot show **each** exhibit, a substitute may show. Substitute must be current Audubon County 4-H or FFA member and wear uniform. Attending school, military service, or special medical reasons must receive prior approval from department superintendent and Clover Commissions.
- 7. 4-H/FFA uniform is required when exhibitor is with a judge, before an audience, or participating or assisting in a 4-H or FFA activity. It is not required for preparation day or clean-up. Uniform is:
  - Clean 4-H/FFA T-shirt and blue jeans. NO skirts, NO walking shorts, NO sandals allowed.

- Caps are not permitted.
- Hard-soled shoes or boots are recommended for livestock exhibitors. All other exhibitors must wear tennis shoes or boots during static judging. Exhibitor must wear correct exhibitor number while showing livestock.
- Horse members must wear long-sleeved solid colored shirt (no zippers, no bling), 4-H armband or emblem, and hard-soled shoes or boots. Helmet required every time/every ride.
- Violation of rule will result in disqualification.
- 8. Forms and fees are **DUE** to Extension Office by 5:30 PM, Thursday, June 29. **LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. NO FEES WILL BE REFUNDED. Static**entries **DO NOT** require pre-entry.
  - \* Beef \$2/head, bedding donated by Audubon Co. Cattlemen
  - \* Goat, Dairy, Sheep, Swine \$2/head
  - \* Horse \$3/head
  - \* Dog, Pet, Poultry, Rabbit \$1/head
- 9. Product, business, or breeder advertising signs are not allowed.
- 10. Exhibits are judged in blue and red groupings. Some classes award purple and lavender ribbons. Purple awards are given to champion, reserve, and state fair exhibits. Champion and reserve are eligible for grand and reserve grand champion.
- 11. Red ribbon exhibits **cannot** be considered for champion, reserve champion, state fair or honorable mention.
- 12. No additional premiums are given for grand champion, reserve grand champion, champion or reserve champion.
- 13. All premium money is sent to clubs with a listing of exhibitor's earnings. Member premium money may be withheld pending completion and submission of their 4-H record book.
- 14. NO money will be paid on exhibits removed before designated times.

ANIMAL EXHIBIT PREMIUMS listed as purple, lavender blue, red:

**BEEF** -- \$10, \$9, \$7, \$4; pen of three - \$15, \$14, \$12, \$10. **DAIRY, GOAT, HORSE, SHEEP, SWINE** -- \$6, \$5, \$4, \$3 **DOG, PET, POULTRY, RABBIT** -- \$4, \$3, \$2, \$1.

#### PROTEST POLICY

- 1. The Grievance Committee will review a protest in writing and accompanied by a non-refundable \$250 fee. This is a one-time fee per protest filed. The fee will be handled by the Audubon County Fair Board. The fee will be returned if the Grievance Committee decides in favor of the individual who submitted the protest.
- 2. Protests must be submitted to Audubon County Extension Staff as soon as possible and no later than twelve (12) hours after the incident has taken place.
- 3.Members should work with the appropriate Department Superintendent to address their issue first. All Livestock Superintendents must follow the 4-H 202-Iowa 4-H Livestock Identification Requirements.
- 4.All decisions made by the judges are final and are not subject to appeal.

#### **Grievance Committee**

1. The Grievance Committee is established for the purpose of reviewing protests/appeals pertaining to 4-H and FFA activities at the Audubon County Fair. The committee will be made up of:

- a. County Extension Staff
- b. One Department Superintendent
- c. One Audubon County Extension Council member
- d. One Audubon County Fair Board member.
- e. One Clover Commissions member
- 2. No member of this committee will be related to the individual filing the appeal.
- 3. The Grievance Committee decision will be final.
- 4. The Grievance Committee will review appeals in a timely matter and no later than 24 hours after the appeal has been filed.

#### APPEAL POLICY

- 1. The Grievance Committee will review an appeal in writing and accompanied by a non-refundable \$250 fee. This is a one-time fee per appeal filed. The fee will be handled by the Audubon County Fair Board. The fee will be returned if the Grievance Committee decides in favor of the individual who submitted the appeal.
- 2. Appeals must be submitted to Audubon County Extension Staff as soon as possible and no later than twelve (12) hours after the incident has taken place.
- 3. Members should work with the appropriate Department Superintendent to address their issue first. All Livestock Superintendents must follow the 4-H 202-Iowa 4-H Livestock Identification Requirements.
- 4. All decisions made by the judges are final and are not subject to appeal.

#### LIVESTOCK RULES

- 1. Exhibits must have been owned, raised, cared for, and managed by member during this 4-H/FFA year. For all purebred animals, exhibitor must show registration papers, ownership, and pedigrees by June 1. Papers should be in the 4-H/FFA member's name OR show a logical family relationship.
- 2. All beef, sheep, swine, horses, dogs, dairy, and goats must match official ID entered into 4-H Online 2.0 by May 15 or they will be disqualified. Beef (market, bottle/bucket, feeder), sheep, market goats and swine must have official 4-H ear tag. Dairy animals and breeding goats may use 4-H ear tag, neck chain or other ID method. All breeding heifers must have two ID methods this includes a tattoo (required) and a 4-H ear tag or a calfhood vaccination number or a registration number (if registered). Lost 4-H ear tags must be reported to the Extension Office.
- 3. Exhibitors are required to complete YQCA to show beef, sheep, swine, goats, dairy, rabbits, and poultry.
- 4. NO STRAW may be used as bedding, only wood chips. All exhibitors, except beef, must furnish bedding. Bedding must be cleaned out of stalls/pens to center aisle before leaving fair.
- 5. It is the intent that the 4-H'er take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it must be done by a family member and/or another Iowa 4-H'er. Family members include and are limited to: parent/legal guardian, brother, sister, step-siblings or grandparents.
- 6. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects of conformation or altering hair color will be considered

- as fraud or deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred.
- 7. All animals must be kept in the barns on the fairgrounds. No animals may be in their trailers at any time after check-in.
- 8. Suggested chore times before 9 AM and between 5-7 PM.
- 9. Electric prods are not allowed. Butt fans are not allowed in the aisles.
- 10. Animal in 4-H/FFA class may be entered in corresponding open class, if an entry is made and fees paid to fair secretary. **Exception:** Poultry and rabbits shown in 4-H/FFA classes may **not** be shown in open class.
- 11. Superintendent **may** combine or divide classes, based on number of entries.
- 12. Announcements the day of show will take precedence over any previous written information.
- 13. Show orders for all shows will be posted by 6:30 PM the evening before the show. Extension Staff will need to be notified by 7:30 PM that evening if there are any errors or changes to be made.
- 14. Suggested items to bring to fair: Feed and water pans, fan, buckets, feed, grooming supplies, halters, show stick, extension cord, broom, pitchfork, wheelbarrow, and/or anything else to prepare animal for exhibit. Read 4-H project material for more help.

#### HERDSMANSHIP

Superintendents: Audubon FFA Alumni

- 1. Awards will be given to the top three 4-H/FFA clubs.
- 2. Judges inspect exhibits twice daily.

3. Judging is based on: Cleanliness of alleys, Animals clean and well groomed, Bedding - adequate, clean and in place, Safe and proper storage of equipment, Equipment/feed clean and arranged, and Stall cards readable and neat.

#### **SHOWMANSHIP**

- 1. Members showing market and breeding animals are eligible to compete in each project they exhibit. Exhibitors must show their own animals.
- 2. Showmanship is based on appearance and attitude of exhibitor, condition of animal, personal safety, grooming (clipping/cleanliness) of animal, and presentation of animal.
- 3. The same judge placing livestock will judge showmanship.
- 4. Exhibitors must compete in their own age division.

Showmanship classes are as follows:

Junior - 4th, 5th, 6th grader Intermediate - 7th, 8th grader Senior - 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th graders

Master – Winners from their respective age division including current year winners

- 5. Master showmanship is for exhibitors who previously have won first place in their current age division and may participate ONLY in this class.
- 6. Must have at least two entries to have a class. Intermediate and senior showmanship may be combined, with all 7<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> graders showing in the **senior** showmanship division.

#### LIVESTOCK SUPPORT AUCTION

Superintendents: Mike Albertsen, Scott Alt, Amanda Buck, Brittney Klocke, Derek Deist

- 1. All market animal exhibitors are eligible for support money at the sale.
- 2. Each exhibitor may go through sale ring **once per species** (market rabbit, market broilers, beef, sheep, goat, swine). An exhibitor who is both a 4-H **and** FFA member, is considered **one** exhibitor.
- 3. This auction is for support money only. There will be no packer available and livestock will not change hands. All livestock will return home unless other arrangements have been made.

#### BEEF DEPARTMENT

Superintendent: Scott Alt

#### SECTION 1 - MARKET BEEF

- 1. Three individual market beef may be entered by one member. Members of both 4-H and FFA may enter four market beef total.
- 2. Exhibitor may use colored grooming aides on hooves only. Beef with evidence of painting, dying, or use of color agents may not be shown.
- 3. Beef may not be shown with horns. Stubs and spurs must be filed flat to at least 1" of the skull.
- 3. All haltered market beef entries are eligible for rate-of-gain.
- 4. Trophies awarded to

#### SHOWMANSHIP - junior, intermediate/senior, master

#### **SECTION 2 – PEN OF THREE**

- 1. Member may enter one pen of three, either 4-H or FFA.
- 2. Exhibitor must post an information poster at cattle pen by 6 PM Thursday.
- 3. Judging is based on interview, poster, and live evaluation. Animals are **not** considered for rate of gain contest.
- 4. Trophy awarded to Champion Pen of Three T-Bone Association

#### CLASS

21 - Pen-of-Three Cattle

#### **SECTION 3 – BEEF BREEDING HEIFERS**

- 1. Member may enter any number of entries and participate in showmanship.
- Heifers shown in these classes cannot be shown in any market beef classes. Dual purpose breeds may show in only one department.
- 3. Purebred classes are divided into breeds as numbers merit: Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, and other recognized breeds. Commercial breeding heifers include crossbreds and those not eligible for purebred classes.
- 4. Trophies awarded to

#### **CLASSES**

- 32 Junior Yearling Heifer; born January 1 April 30, 2021
- 33 Summer Yearling Heifer; born May 1 August 31, 2021
- 34 Senior Heifer; born September 1 December 31, 2020

#### **SECTION 4 – BOTTLE BUCKET CALF**

- 1. Newborn/orphan dairy or beef calf, born January 1 May 15, 2023, and in member's possession within two weeks of birth.
- 2. Calf must be bottle bucket fed. (No nursing permitted.)
- 3. Member may enter one 4-H or FFA calf steer, bull, or heifer.
- 4. Calves are shown on halter.
- 5. Conformation/quality of calf is not considered in judging. Judging is based on:
  - what member learned about care and raising calf
  - member knowledge of health, condition, management
  - member knowledge related to fitting and showing
- 6. 2<sup>nd</sup> year bottle/bucket may enter market or breeding class.
- 7. Trophy awarded to Champion Bottle Bucket Calf A&P Cattle

#### CLASS

41 - Bottle Bucket Calf

#### **SECTION 5 - FEEDER CALF**

- 1. Any calf, born January 1- May 15 this year, in member's possession within two weeks of birth.
- 2. Member may enter two 4-H or FFA calves one steer/bull and one heifer.
- 3. Calf is raised on natural mother. Cow will not be shown. Calves are shown on halter and taken home after the show.
- 4. Judging is based on conformation/quality of calf.

- 8. All sexually intact sheep must be identified with an individual Scrapic Flock of Origin identification tag. No sexually intact males may be shown or on the grounds at any time.
- 9. Breeding and Market classes will be determined at fair weighin. NO changes are allowed after the 4-Her verifies this information.

- 1. Member must wear an American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved head gear with chin strap and properly fitted harness while mounted and riding anywhere on the fairgrounds - helmet every time, every ride (warm up and class).
- 2. Exhibitor may identify and bring 5 head to fair. Each horse is limited to two premiums.
- 3. A "Leased" horse is any horse that is not owned by the 4-H'er or his/her immediate family (parents, siblings, guardians). Leased horses are not eligible in halter class. They are eligible in showmanship and riding classes.
- 4. Horses and ponies are classified according to height. Colts must enter class according to size of sire. If sire is a horse, foal is a horse.

Horses - 14 hands and over Ponies - under 56 inches

- 5. Horse/pony project members must attend six 4-H club business meetings and are required to work with their animal during at least THREE county horse project meetings at the fairgrounds for junior members or TWO for Int./Sr. members under supervision of superintendent and/or horse project leaders.
- 6. Each horse/pony may enter both English and Western Pleasure but will only receive one pleasure premium.
- 7. Each horse/pony may enter both English and Western Equitation.
- 8. Exhibitor may make horse substitutions with vet certificate. Substitutes must be cleared with superintendent and properly identified on horse ID.
- 9. No substitute showmen allowed in performance classes. If exhibitor has two horses in halter, champion or reserve classes, substitute showman may be used.
- 10. Quarter horse/quarter horse type consists of registered and non-registered horses, stock horses, and some grade horses. Light horses are Arabian/Arabian type, Morgan/Morgan type, Paso, etc. Other breeds consist of Appaloosa/Appaloosa type, Paint/Paint
- 11. In Hand Trail eligible horses can be of any age but not participate in any other trail class.
- 12. Each horse is eligible for only one Western Pleasure Class. (Classes 9025-9029)
- 13. Classes 9023 and 9024 are for 4-H'ers who are not yet ready to lope. Participants in those classes are not eligible for any other riding classes.
- 14. Class 9022-Horseless Horse is a halter showmanship class. The Horseless horse project is open to any 4-Her that does not currently own a horse. The exhibitor must work with a horse project member and their horse throughout the year and at one project meeting at the fairgrounds. #### STATIC (NON-ANIMAL) RULES

- 1. General rules and regulations apply to entire division.
- 2. Exhibits may be done by an **individual or group**. Each group exhibit receives one premium. Each *member* must meet eligibility requirements for exhibit to advance to state fair and get a ribbon.
- 3. An exhibit is an outgrowth of project work during current 4-H year. Exhibit may be a product, poster, display, report, model, video, notebook, etc. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits.
- 4. Exhibit classes are broad categories. Member should use project materials to determine goals and plan learning experiences. Member may have someone else do part of exhibit but must tell the judge. Exhibit will **not** be eligible for state fair.
- 5. Member may enter **five** exhibits per project area with no more than twenty total. Each exhibit needs a completed entry tag.
- 6. The member or group goal will be the basis of evaluation. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, quality of work and techniques, general appearance and design.

- 7. Exhibitor visits with a judge in a conference setting. Parents are welcome as **observers** but may **not** participate in conference between judge and member. Member must be prepared to **verbally answer:** 
  - a) What did you plan to learn or do? (what was your goal(s))?
  - b) What steps did you take to learn or do this?
  - c) What were most important things you learned?

Member is encouraged to include a write up for display purposes at county fair. Exhibits advancing to State Fair require additional write up information after county fair.

- 8. Design elements are line, shape, color, texture, and space. Art principles are rhythm, proportion, emphasis, balance and unity. These play a major part of the total evaluation process.
- 9. Endangered and threatened plants and animals/insects, wildflowers, nests, or songbird feathers cannot be used. "Legally taken" game animals are acceptable. Purple loosestife (Lythrum salicaria) cannot be planted in gardens. Live specimins of noxious weeds or invasive species are NOT permitted in any exhibit. Other dried noxious weeds are acceptable.
- 10. Each club is assigned a booth (4'x 8'x 4' wide; 6' tall) to decorate and display exhibits. Decorating theme is based on the fair theme. Booths must be completed by 6 PM, Wednesday.

#### STATE FAIR

Superintendent of processing state fair entries: Molly Yock

- 1. Judging area is closed during selection and processing of state fair exhibits. To advance to State Fair, all participants must have completed 5<sup>th</sup> grade.
- 2. Maximum size guidelines apply as follows:
- Poster/banner not to exceed 24"x 36"
- Chart/graph boards/model displays are not to exceed 48"x 48"
- Display boxes may not exceed 28"x22" and 12" in depth
- 3. Exhibits that do not meet size guidelines, copyright, and safety procedures will **NOT** be accepted for entry, evaluation, or display at state fair.
- 4. Volunteers transport state fair exhibits to Des Moines and back. Transportation of large exhibits is responsibility of the family. Each exhibitor is responsible for packing and labeling each exhibit piece for travel.

#### STATIC EXHIBIT CLASSES

#### ANIMALS

10110 Animal Science - An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of an animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science - An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

#### AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

10210 Crop Production and Plant Science - An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils and

soil fertility, or any other learning related to crop production and plant science.

10220 Conservation, Environment and Sustainability - An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

10222 Entomology - An exhibit (excluding live specimens) that shows learning or is an outgrowth of an entomology or bee project

experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

10224 Fish and Wildlife - An exhibit that shows learning about

a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

10226 Forestry - An exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

10230 Horticulture and Plant Science - An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock.)

10235 Home Grounds Improvement - An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

10240 Outdoor Adventures - An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports - An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows).

10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resources - An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

#### CREATIVE ARTS

10310 Music - An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

10320 Photography - An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

#### Photography Special Rules:

- Photographs may be either black and white or color.
- Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- Photographs should be a minimum of 5" x 7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11" x 14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
- All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted. Mazzimum thickness of finished project may not exceed '4" thick..
- Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
- 4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related to or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in storyorder or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6" x 8".
- Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
- Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
   Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
- Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice-versa.

10340 Creative Photography - A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative, and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple photographs.

Alternative/Creative Photography Special Rules:

- Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
- If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4" in length or larger than 14" in length.
- Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from a film negative.
- Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits.
   Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.
- Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 Photography Idea/Educational Display - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class may include educational displays about printing, processing, editing, marketing, branding, merchandising, etc., as it relates to photography.

10540 Digital Storytelling – Entries will be entered through Personal Development class 10540 - An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

10350 Visual Arts Original Art - An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is a one of a kind, non replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

Exploration - This class emphasizes process and provides the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged, or have copyright permission obtained. See Visual Arts Special Rule #5 and #6.

10360 Visual Arts - Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics - Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or

marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc. Visual Arts Special Rules:

Items entered must be ready for display in the home, gallery, or intended final display location: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.

Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are

- usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at www.extension.iastate. edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
- Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
- Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/visual-art.

#### **FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCES**

10410 Child Development - An exhibit that shows learning about children. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit. Exhibit examples include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, safety and health, etc.

10420 Clothing and Fashion – Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories - A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care.

Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10422 Clothing and Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories - Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10424 Clothing and Fashion – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits - Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

#### Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.  Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

**10430** Consumer Management - An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, or consumer rights and responsibilities.

10440 Food & Nutrition - Prepared Product - An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding prepared food products. Display boxes are not allowed for prepared products at the Iowa State Fair.

10442 Food & Nutrition – Preserved Product - An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at

https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding preserved food products.

10445 Food & Nutrition – Educational Display - An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation & service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning & service must include a menu.

#### Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

- Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- · Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2021 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Exhibit Label.
- Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the

bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit: Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. – four (4) to six (6) items Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. – one (1) whole product.

 The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

10450 Health - An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, physical activity, safe activities, skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

10460 Home Improvement - An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or

refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

#### Home Improvement Special Rules:

- Items entered must be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- Exhibit wirte-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s), designer(s), artist(s).

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts - A constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, etc.. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

10472 Sewing and Needle Arts – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits - Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers, etc.

Note: Exhibits in classes 10470 and 10472 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

10480 Other Family and Consumer Science - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Special Exhibition - THRIFTY MEAL CHALLENGE 10490 - \$10 Meal Challenge — Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$11.

#### Special Rules:

- Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- · All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
- Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- The meal must serve four (4) people and total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$10.
- The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups. Recommended portion sizes per person: ½ cup fruit, ½ cup vegetable, 3 ounces protein, 1-2 ounces grain, 1 cup equivalent dairy.

- The meal must serve four (4) people.
- Total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$11.
- The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20" x 30") that includes:
  - Menu
  - Meal type
  - Copy of receipts (up to 2)
  - Photos of participant experience
  - Thrifty Meal Challenge Worksheet (required)

#### PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement - An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 Communication - An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction and non-fiction, etc.

10530 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit - Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is ... (open to 4-H'er's interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Opportunity4All (2022 National 4-H Week theme)
- Spy Your Potential (2023 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- Best Days Ever (in 4-H) (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)

#### Poster Communication Special Rules:

- Only one poster per 4-H member may be entered.
- All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board - size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
- Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, etc.
- Posters cannot be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
- Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
- Posters cannot use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
- 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
- All 4-H Communication Posters will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments.
   Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

10540 Digital Storytelling – (See also Creative Arts) An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

**10550** Leadership - An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

**10560** Self-Determined - An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

#### SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY

10610 Mechanics - An exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

10612 Automotive - Repaired or restored vehicle (Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, (tentatively) Thursday August 10.)

10613 Automotive - Educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems

**10614** Electric - Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine - Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor - Repaired or restored tractor. Note: A conference judging opportunity for exhibitors of repaired or restored tractors in class 10616 will be offered during exhibit check-in. (Conference judging may not be available during all check-in times.) Tractors will be displayed outside throughout the Iowa State Fair. Release time Sunday, August 21, after 7:00 p.m.

**10617** Tractor - Educational display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.

**10618** Welding - Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

**10620** Woodworking - An exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

10630 Science, Engineering & Technology - An exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS) or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

10632 Aerospace - Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

10634 Robotics - Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) that shows learning about robotics and robotic systems.

#### Science, Engineering & Technology Special Rule:

 Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering & Technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa.

#### GARDEN PLOTS

#### Wednesday, July 12, Fairgrounds, 9:30 AM

- 1.Member must prepare, plant, and maintain 5'x 8' plot at fairgrounds to be maintained ALL summer.
- 2. Judging is based on garden plan & layout, soil improvement, maintenance (weeding, watering, pest control, replacement of plants), knowledge of selected plants, and write up/documentation (goals, learning, expense and maintenance logs)..
- 3. Exhibitors will check in with the Garden Plot judge, at their convenience, between 9:30 and noon. Garden Plot exhibitors that have not checked in by noon will not be judged.
- 4. Member must clean out their plot before October 1.
- 5. Exhibitors who want their work to be considered for the Iowa State Fair should submit their Garden Plot book as a Horticulture exhibit during regular Static Exhibit Judging, Class #10230 either prior to or following judging of the physical garden plot.

Special awards will be presented to Top Junior plot and Top Int/Senior plot.

#### CLOTHING SELECTION/FASHION REVUE/ \$20 CHALLENGE

#### Monday, July 10, Methodist Church, Audubon, 5 PM

Superintendent: Julie McVay

- 1. Member should be but doesn't have to be enrolled in clothing to participate in fashion revue, clothing selection and \$15 challenge contests.
- a) Clothing Selection outfit may be purchased from used clothing store, consignment shop, etc. Home-sewn items are not eligible unless garment was purchased from used clothing source. Items custom sewn for participant are not eligible.
- b) Fashion Revue garment must be constructed, crocheted or knitted by participant. Outfit may be one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suit, vest, slacks, skirt, sportswear, coats, etc. Juniors may have part of outfit purchased such as purchased blouse with constructed shorts.
- c) \$20 Challenge -outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, or resale shop Goodwill, Salvation Army or other stores of this type. Hand me downs or clothing as gifts that

- were selected by 4-H'ers belong in Clothing Selection. \$20 Challenge outfits MUST have the receipt with it.
- 2. Member may enter one outfit in each contest. Participant will have a ten minute conference when he/she will model for judge.
- 3. Four senior fashion revue eligible with no more than two from any one category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume) and three senior clothing selection with no more than one from any one category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear and costume) and three \$20 challenge participations with no more than one from any one category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear and costume) are eligible for state fair.
- 4. Trophies awarded to Top Junior and Int./ Sr Fashion Revue, Top Clothing Selection Junior and Int/Sr, Top \$20 Challenge Junior and Int./ Sr,

#### COMMUNICATIONS

#### Wednesday, July 12, Agrihall, 2 PM

- 1. For Educational Presentations, Share the Fun, Working Exhibits, member may participate as an individual, small group, or a 4-H club. To advance to State Fair, all participants must have completed 5<sup>th</sup> grade.
- 2. Member must use sanitary/safe equipment and procedures.
- 3. Entries must be in good taste and not offensive to anyone.
- 4. Trophies awarded to top presentation and working exhibit. Ribbons awarded to each participant considered for State Fair.

#### EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATIONS

**Purpose:** Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.

#### **Educational Presentation Rules**

- Time limit: Junior Presentations (5th and 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th - 12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to "STOP" when they exceed the time limit.
- Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts of from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.
- A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.

#### EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING

**Purpose:** Encourage the development of communication skills by provideing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

- 1. Participants must be senior 4-H members completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023.
- Each county may enter a maximum of two (2) entries; individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 3. Program format:
  - Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
    - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room.
       The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H.
       The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
  - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other

- adult, or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
- All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
  - Participant may bring their own books, magazines, or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.
  - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines, or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
  - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
- d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H members own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
- e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
- f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown timecards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the timekeeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
- g. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name, the county they represent, and read the selected question.
- h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters, or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.
- 4. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
  - a. Content related to topic
  - b. Knowledge of the subject
  - c. Organization of material
  - d. Power of expression
  - e. Voice
  - f. Stage presence
  - g. General effect
  - h. Response to questions
- 5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.

#### SHARE THE FUN

**Purpose:** Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to share their skill and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

#### Share-The-Fun Rules

 Eligibility: 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023. <u>Exception</u>: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a <u>whole</u> club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:

- At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2023.
- Clover Kids are not eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair.
- Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.
- Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment are acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- All acts must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
- General judge's comments for the entire show will occur at the Iowa State Fair. No individual conference with the judge will occur.

#### TABLE SETTING CONTEST

**Purpose:** The table setting contest is a fun way to learn how to properly set a table, plan nutritious meals, express originality and creativity in choosing a theme, present to a judge, express knowledge of food, nutrition and food safety, and have fun in planning a special occasion meal for entertaining.

- 1. Exhibitors may work as an individual or in a team of two members with the grade division determined by the oldest of the two members.
- 2. Exhibitors may enter only one Table Setting entry.
- 3. Exhibitors may choose to enter a casual or formal exhibit. a.Casual themed place settings would include events planned for indoors or outdoors using any type of table cover (tablecloth, blanket, or paper), and any type of table service.
  - b.Formal themed place settings would include more than three pieces of flatware along with china, tablecloth and/or mats, and cloth napkins.
- 4. Exhibitors must bring their own structure that functions as a table for the display, unless being seated on the floor fits with the theme (example: picnic). In this case, an appropriate covering may be placed on the floor. A sturdy card table size is ideal, unless approved by staff.
- 5. Exhibitors are to display one place setting, including table covering, dinnerware, stemware or glasses, flatware, centerpiece, menu and write up.
- 6. Exhibitors should wear clothing that coordinates with the theme/occasion of their table setting entry. Appearance and personal hygiene will be part of the evaluation.
- 7. Exhibitors must set their own table without assistance from others.
- 8. Menus should contain food groups according to MyPlate.
- Prepared food is NOT part of the exhibit. However, exhibitors should be familiar with recipes and how they are safely prepared and served.

#### WORKING EXHIBITS

Purpose: Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

#### Working Exhibit Rules

- 1. Time limit: All participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30-minute period.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in <u>one</u> Working Exhibit per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.
- 10. Foods should be listed in the order they will be served. List beverages last. Foods that are served together should be grouped. Used single line spacing between food items and double line spacing between courses. When an item on the menu has food or sauce that goes with it, they should be placed on the same line with the main item to the left. Capital letters should be used at the beginning of all words except a, an, and, or, for, to, with, or, on.
- 11. Menus must be displayed on the table. Examples may include an index card or paper, ceramic tile, chalkboard, etc. and be printed or typed by the participants. The menu can be decorated and/or propped.
- 12. Evaluation will include an interview with the judge. Participants should be prepared to talk about the theme of their table, the menu, food preparation and food safety. Exhibitors will be asked age appropriate questions regarding recipes for the provided menu and food safety practices.
- 13. Table settings should follow appropriate table setting guidelines.
- 14. If candles are included in the table setting, they must not be lit.
- 15. Alcoholic beverages may not be used in any menu. Stemware is allowed.
- 16. A Junior, Intermediate and Senior Individual or Team will be selected for each of the two categories, Casual and Formal, and have the opportunity to represent the county at the Southwest Field Table Setting Contest in August.

#### OPEN CLASS RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All static exhibits (non-livestock) MUST be entered by NOON Thursday, July 13, in the fair board secretary's office. The actual exhibit must be in place in the Agri-Hall and the Antique Building by 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 13. (You may also enter items on Wednesday, July 12 between 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

**NOTE:** Food items, cut flowers, garden greens, blackberries, raspberries, fresh herbs, and other perishables *may be delivered* on Friday, July 14 by 8 AM, but still MUST be entered Thursday by NOON.

- 2. Entry blanks are in the back of this book. All entries must be made in the name of the owner and be the work of that person.
- 3. There is NO entry fee for static exhibits.
- 4. Static exhibits which have received previous awards at the Audubon County Fair cannot be entered again.
- 5. During the entry process, exhibitors will receive a card, which must be completed and attached to exhibit.
- 6. Static exhibits must remain in place from entry until dismissal on Sunday, July 16 at 2:30 PM. Premium money will be forfeited for early removal. Items left after that time will not be the responsibility of fair board.
- 7. Pedigrees are required on purebred beef one year old or over. Animals under one year old must show papers of dam and sire. Failure to comply will forfeit all fees and bar exhibitor.
- 8. Animal exhibitors are expected to have animals ready and be at gate when class is called. If they are not, disqualification is at the decision of the superintendent.
- 9. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, BIRDS AT A 4-H/FFA FAIR. Decisions of the Official Show Vet are FINAL.

All animals must show every indication of good health or will not be shown. Any evidence of warts, ringworm, footrot, pink eye, sore mouth, draining abscesses or other contagious or infectious conditions, will eliminate the animal from the show.

No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on animals or poultry exhibited at fair; but animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly after, by accredited veterinarian. Each show **must** have an official veterinarian.

Quarantined animals cannot be exhibited.

Swine exhibitors must sign and present owner affidavit that animals did not originate from quarantined herd and swine dysentery or pseudorabies has not been in evidence 12 months. All swine brought to fairgrounds during County Fair will be consigned directly to slaughter. None may return home.

POULTRY AND BIRDS -All poultry must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition. Test must be performed by an authorized tester. Market classes consigned to slaughter are exempt from Salmonella testing; but must be separated from all other poultry by ten or more feet and/or an eight-foot solid partition.

**DOGS, CATS, PETS** - All dogs and cats **must** have a current rabies vaccination. It is **recommended** dogs under one year old have parvo shots. Health papers for other pets are **not** required.

SHEEP AND GOATS -Sexually intact sheep and goats must have an individual Scrapies Flock of Origin identification tag.

# IMPORTANT POINTS IN SELECTING HORTICULTURE PRODUCTS

**Apples** – Fruit should be free from insects, disease and mechanical injury. Color should extend well down in the basal end. Missing stems will be scored against.

**Beets** - Best size is 2-3 inches in diameter, smooth, well-shaped for the variety, and firm. Flesh should show a deep dark red color. White rings are undesirable.

Beets, Carrots, Parsnips – should have 1-2" of top left.

Cabbage – Outer leaves left on. Wrapper leaves removed.

Onions – Skin should be clean and bright, uniform in color and free from stain. Skin should not be broken and outer skin must not be removed. Neck should be small and dry. This indicates proper ripening and good keeping quality. Specimen should be solid, crisp and well matured.

Potatoes – Best size is 6 to 12 ounces. They should be free of soil, injury, and disease. They should be true to variety and uniform in type, quality, and size.
